The Daily Schedule

What should we know about our schedule?

We will be on a semester block schedule for the 2009-2010 school year. There will be four (4) 90-minute classes daily during each term. For the entire year, there will be eight (8) classes. Freshmen (9), sophomores (10), and juniors (11) must take 8 classes. Seniors (12) must take at least 6 classes.

Graduation Requirements
What do we need to graduate?

1. A student must pass the South Carolina HSAP and have **24 units** to qualify for a South Carolina High School Diploma including the following:

**Only 6 summer school units may be applied toward the first 24 units for a SC High School Diploma.*

Note** Computer Tech 2 can NOT be taken as a math credit under any circumstances.

2. We have to attend the accredited high school issuing the diploma for at least one semester preceding our graduation. Any work done under any arrangement other than these specifically provided for by the high school standards can not be recognized for credit toward the State High School Diploma. We must comply with the provisions of the comprehensive Health Education Act of 1988. The stipulation which specifically applies to us reads as follows: "Beginning with the 1989-90 school year, at least one time during the four years of grades nine through twelve, each student shall receive instruction in comprehensive health education, including at least seven

Student Indebtedness

We must pay all debts owed to the school or school district for lost books, fees, or other reasons. If we do not clear all debts, we will **NOT** be allowed to:

- Purchase a parking pass or park on campus until all debts are cleared.
- Purchase the use of a locker until all debts are cleared.
- Participate in senior activities such as picking up cap and gown, having cap and gown pictures taken, marching in the Awards Day ceremony, or participating in graduation exercises.

Parking

What should we know about parking?

- We must park only in our assigned areas.
- We must register if we are driving to school.

- We will be charged a registration fee and will be given a parking tag. Our tags must be visible from the outside of our cars.
- We must not loiter in the parking lot after we arrive at school.

Minor violations include but are not limited to:

Discipline for minor violations may include:

Referral 1: \$ 3.00 Citation and warning

Referral 2: Loss of driving privilege for 5 days

Referral 3: Loss of driving privilege for remainder of semester

Referral 4: Suspension of driving privilege for the rest of the school year

Major violations include but are not limited to:

Parking in front of school during regular school hours (circle)
Carrying other students off campus without permission

Vehicle not registered
Parking in handicapped space
Parking in unauthorized area during regular school hours (behind the gym, mobile units, teacher parking lot, the south of the technical wing)
Entering parking lot without permission during regular school hours (Permission must be from an administrator or parking lot official.)

Discipline for major violations may include:

Referral 1: \$ 5.00 Citation and/or loss of driving privileges for 5 days

Referral 2: Loss of driving privileges for nine weeks

Referral 3: Suspension of driving privilege for the rest of the school year

Unsafe Actions and Reckless Operation of a Motor Vehicle include but are not limited to:

Speeding
Horse Playing (Reckless Driving)
Entering parking lot other than main gate to student parking lot
Any action involving a motor vehicle that may cause harm to self or others

These violations require the following actions:

Loss of driving privilege for a minimum of two weeks and a maximum of the remainder of the year (depending on the severity of the offense).

Report Cards

What do we need to know about report cards?

Central High School will be on a 9-week grading period this year. We will receive interim reports after 4½ weeks of each grading period.

Lockers

What should we know about our lockers?

- Lockers are provided for our books and materials.
- We do not own our lockers, and they can be checked at any time.
- Only school-issued locks may be used on our lockers.

Student Tardiness

What should we know about tardiness?

- If we are late for school in the morning, we will not be admitted to class without an admission slip from the attendance office.
- If we arrive tardy to school or to a class without a valid excuse, we will be sent to In-School Detention for the remainder of the period.
- Students are responsible for all work missed due to tardiness.
- Valid excuses for tardiness include medical notes, late buses, and documented car trouble.

Make-up Work

What should we know about make-up work?

- It is our responsibility to find out what assignments we've missed and to arrange immediately with our teachers to make up missed assignments.
- Failure to make up work will result in an Incomplete or failing grades on our report card.

Telephones

What should we know about telephones?

- Cell phones or other communication devices (such as pagers, etc.) ***are not to be turned on or visible*** in the school building. Violation of this rule will result in disciplinary action.

- We should remember that office phones are for school business. Phone messages will not be delivered to us during class except in case of an emergency. Calls to request early dismissal must be made through the office.

Hall Passes

What do we need to know about hall passes?

During class time, we should not be in the halls or on campus without a pass. When we leave class, we should have a pass with our destination and the time signed by the teacher. When we reach our destination, that teacher should sign the pass and write on it the time we return to class.

Restricted Areas

What should we know about restricted areas?

- We aren't allowed on the ball fields except during PE classes.
- We can use only the bathrooms next to the cafeteria during lunch and during class time.
- We can't be in the parking lot except before and after school.
- The gymnasium is off limits to all students during normal school hours except during assigned class periods.

Attendance Regulations

What should we know about attendance?

The attendance regulations for us while attending Central High School are outlined below:

1. We are expected to attend school regularly.
2. The only reasons we can be absent and not have the absence count against us for the purpose of determining course credit are:
 - chronic or extended illnesses or
 - emergency conditions that are approved by the principal

All notes concerning absences must be submitted to the attendance clerk within ten days of the absence.

3. In special cases, we may get permission from the principal for trips of an educational nature. We will not be excused for trips of a personal nature, work, shopping, etc. Our absences in such cases will be countable, and no credit will be given for classes missed.
4. Local dental and doctor's appointments during school hours are discouraged except in case of emergencies. We should make plans for such appointments to take place outside of school hours. In case of an absence due to a visit to a doctor or dentist, we must present a note signed by the doctor or dentist within ten days.
5. We will not be permitted to leave school during the school day unless a parent or guardian comes for us. We may be permitted to leave school with a parent note only if the attendance clerk can reach that parent/guardian by telephone prior to dismissal time. Notes must be submitted prior to the beginning of the school day.
6. We will be allowed to leave class only at the change of a period and/or at lunch. We will not be allowed to leave class during the middle of a period.
7. If we cut school or are absent without permission, we can expect disciplinary action.
8. If we miss more than 30 minutes of the class, we will be marked absent. In order for us to participate in any school-sponsored activity on that day, we must be present at least half of the school day. We must be present at least half of the day on the Friday before the prom in order to attend the prom.
9. If we arrive at school late or leave early, we will have to be present in each block at least one hour in order to be counted present for that class. As long as we attend long enough to receive credit for the class, we can be considered as having perfect attendance at the end of the year.
10. Attendance is kept on the basis of class periods. We will not receive credit for any one-half credit courses in which we are absent for more than three countable days. We will not receive credit for any full credit courses in which we are absent for more than five countable days. This rule will be strictly

enforced. Examples of countable absences and not countable absences are listed below.

Extracurricular Activities

What should we know about extracurricular activities?

We are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities (clubs, band, athletics, prom, etc.). We may see any of our teachers for a list of available clubs, activities, and sponsors. **We should remember that in order to participate in any extracurricular activities, we must attend school at least 1/2 day on the day of the activity.** If we are absent for more than 1/2 day, we may NOT participate. We must be present at least half of the day on the Friday before the prom in order to attend the prom. We must check with the principal if we have any questions.

Student Discipline

What should we know about discipline?

We are required to conduct ourselves at all times in a manner that will be in the best interest of the school. Proper conduct is required both on campus and at all school-sponsored activities. Any conduct from us that disrupts instruction, involves substantial disorder, or invades the rights of others is a basis for disciplinary action. We will be given a Student Discipline Handbook at the beginning of the year. This handbook will be taught to us, and we will be required to pass a discipline code test.

If we violate the rules set forth in the Student Discipline Handbook, the extent of our punishment will depend on our circumstances, such as number of offenses, repeated offenses, whether prior warnings have been given, and whether prior suspensions have been given.

School Bus Transportation

School bus transportation is authorized only for pupils regularly enrolled in public schools and who meet other requirements of the laws of the state of South Carolina. **This is a privilege for each student to enjoy rather than a right.**

The school will do everything possible to provide all students with the most able driver, the best equipment, and the safest program available.

Students should always be at their bus stop before the bus arrives. The bus driver has a schedule he must keep, and he doesn't have time to wait for students at each stop.

The driver of the school bus is in complete charge of the passengers while they are aboard. Students should do as the driver asks. If there is a complaint, one should take it to the school's principal or the bus supervisor at the high school.

- Students should not tamper with the emergency door or other equipment of the bus.
- Passengers must not mar or deface the bus, and the seat coverings must not be damaged in any way. Students who vandalize or damage a school bus will be charged for the repair of the damages.
- Students must not fight or create any disturbance on the bus.
- Students must not shout to pedestrians or occupants of other vehicles and must not throw objects from the windows.
- Smoking, eating, and drinking are not permitted on buses.
- The use of profanity and obscene gestures is not permitted.
- Students should never enter a restricted area set aside for bus loading or parking without permission.
- Students are expected to ride the bus they are assigned (bus stopping closest to their homes).

All students riding the bus will obey the principal and teachers at each school the bus serves. Central High School students are not allowed to get off the bus either at the middle school or the elementary school without permission from the bus supervisor or an administrator. Any student who disobeys any school official on any school ground shall forfeit his transportation privilege.

Penalties for violations of bus rules and regulations may result in the following:

- Loss of privilege or riding the bus for a prescribed period of time
- Permanent loss of transportation privilege
- In-school suspension
- Out-of-school suspension

- Expulsion from school
- Referral to law enforcement

General Rules of Behavior
How are we expected to behave?

- Our behavior should be in good taste at all times. Public display of affection is not acceptable behavior at school and may result in disciplinary action.
- We are not to run, shout, or slide in the building.
- We are not allowed to possess or play cards while at school.
- We should not bring radios, tape players, beepers, etc., to school. If we do, the items will be placed in the principal's office until a parent conference is held. If there is a second offense, the items will be placed in the office until the last day of school.
- We are allowed in the halls only at the beginning and close of school, while moving from one class to another, or when we have special permission or special duties that require us to be there. Students in the halls during class time must have passes. Students are asked to be courteous at all times and to keep to the right when moving in the halls.

Dress Code
What should we know about our dress code?

- Neatness and cleanliness are expected of all students at all times.
- Clothing items must fit properly. Excessively small-fitting or large-fitting clothing items are not permitted.
- No midriff tops, halter-tops, revealing sundresses, tube tops, tank shirts, or clothing that excessively reveals parts of the body will be worn.
- No hats or sunglasses will be worn in the building.
- All pants/shorts will be worn at the waist (**NO SAGGING**).
- All clothing (shorts, skirts, etc.) must be worn at fingertip length or below with arms extended.
- No unfastened clothes or belts are allowed
- No clothing displaying profane language or pictures is allowed.
- No clothing promoting the use of drugs, alcohol, or tobacco products is allowed.
- Other items that may be considered inappropriate for school will be determined by the administration..

Services

Academic Center

- Computerized academic assistance, small-group instruction, and one-on-one instruction are provided in the academic center via the use of computers.
- After-school study center can be used for making up missed work, re-testing, and making up excessive absences. Students will be allowed to make up a maximum of five unexcused absences.

Credit Recovery

Credit Recovery is a program to help students who did not receive credit because their final average fell in the 65-69 grade range and/or they had 1-3 excessive absences.

Students report to the Homework Center after school for an allotted amount of time to complete assignments from their teachers or to complete lessons assigned through a software program called A+. Students usually have approximately 2 weeks to complete these assignments. They are allowed to work for 2 hours each day after school Monday-Thursday during the school year and 8 am -12 pm during the summer. Since the students either had a 65-69 or 1-3 excessive absences, they are not required to complete the *entire* course again. Usually teachers assign work based on what the students did not complete or areas where the students could use some improvement.

Once a student has completed the assigned material, it is returned to the teacher for review. If a student has a 65-69 average, he will receive a score of 70 for that class. If the student was doing credit recovery because of 1-3 excessive absences, the original grade will be reinstated.

There is a \$50 non-refundable fee that must be paid at the time of the student's application.

Cafeteria

- The cafeteria will serve breakfast and lunch each school day beginning on the first day of school.
- We must clean our tables after we complete our meal.
- We must not yell or scream in the cafeteria. Loud noises may disturb classes.

Teacher Conferences

- All teachers are willing to give us extra help if we make an appointment with them. Teachers are in their rooms before and after school for this reason.
- The study center is also open after school on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 3:30 until 5:30 for assistance and make-up.
- Parent conferences may be arranged with teachers through the guidance office. To set up a parent/teacher conference, parents should call 672-6115 and ask for the guidance department.

Guidance Services

Guidance services are available for us on an ongoing basis. Our parents and we are encouraged to use the guidance program for any reason, including the following:

- personal
- career development
- scheduling
- college/scholarship information
- testing information

A career guidance center is also in operation for us to gain knowledge about career opportunities. A trained career specialist is available to counsel us about

- careers
- internships
- job shadowing experiences
- educational opportunities

Grade Point Ratios and Class Rank

How can we calculate our grade point ratios/class rank?

We can get information on class rank from the guidance office. Our grade point ratios are based on all final grades in the courses we have taken. Our final course averages are turned into quality points, and our average is calculated by totaling the quality points and then dividing by all courses attempted.

For us to be eligible for valedictorian/salutatorian, we must have completed eight high school semesters (Early graduates will not be eligible.). Additionally, the valedictorian/salutatorian must complete the entire senior year at Central and must have been enrolled at Central as a junior for the entire second semester. To be eligible as a Junior Marshal, a student must be one of the top 10 juniors, must have completed 6 high school semesters, and must have been enrolled at Central High School since the beginning of the second semester of the sophomore year.

Valedictorian, salutatorian, marshals (top 10 eligible juniors), and all other honors associated with graduation will be determined at the end of the third nine-weeks. Students graduating with a 3.75 GPR will be designated honor graduates.

Graduation Honors

How do we earn special recognition at graduation?

The top academic student will wear a gold stole at graduation to signify the highest honor graduate. Each additional student with a GPR of 3.75 or higher on the South Carolina Uniform Grading Scale will earn the designation of honor graduate and will wear a white stole at graduation.

Each member in good standing of the following groups will wear a cord at graduation signifying membership in the respective group: Beta Club, Delphian English, Mu Alpha Theta, National Technical Honor Society, and Teacher Cadet.

Uniform Grading Policy for South Carolina High Schools

A uniform grading policy is in effect in all South Carolina high schools. Below are some of the major points about the grading policy.

- All grades on report cards and transcripts will be numerical.
- The numerical breaks for corresponding letter grades are:

93-100 = A; 85-92 = B; 77-84 = C; 70-76 = D; 62-69 = F; 0-61 = F.

- A student who withdraws from a course after 3 days in a 45-day course, five days in a 90-day course, or 10 days in a 180-day course shall be assigned an F (61). The student will get no quality points for this course, and the course will count as a course attempted and be used for GPR calculations.
